### Western Harnett Lions Club Continues Tradition of "Feeding the Hungry"

A sign in the Breadbasket of Sanford reads "Be Nice to Each Other and Eat Until You Are Full". This summarizes the mission of the The breadbasket is a non-profit breadbasket. organization dedicated to feeding the needy. It provides a hot meal to those individuals who cannot afford one, and may otherwise go hungry, and serves anyone who comes through the doors, no questions asked. In spite of the terrible impact of the corona virus, the Western Harnett Lions Club has continued its long tradition of preparing meals for the hungry at the breadbasket. For nearly twelve (12) years, WH Lions have supported the breadbasket 1-3 days every month. The meal typically consists of a meat, vegetable, salad, beverage and desert. Lions prepare the fully-cooked meal, serve those in need, and clean up the kitchen and dining room areas. We currently serve about 130 persons each day. Though the virus has certainly impacted the operation, it has not deterred our commitment to our community and to those in need. Persons can no longer sit, eat, and socialize in the facility, so meals are prepared and packaged as "to go" orders. Regardless of the difficulties, Lions do what is necessary to help the needy of the community. As long-time coordinator for our club, Lion Allen Truhan said, "I am proud that the Lions provide a good meal to those in need. It gives

me great and instant gratification to know that our hard work keeps an individual from going hungry. I am not sure that there is anything more important that we could do for another person, and I am happy to be a part of it." Thanks to Lion Allen, his co-chair, Lion Sherry Powell and to all those Western Harnett Lions who help to feed the hungry of our community . . .We Serve!

# Wilmington Lions Club working hard!





So far this year the Wilmington Lions Club has collected and recycled over 3000 pairs of glasses and sunglasses.

Why Recycle Glasses?

An estimated 120 million people (according to the World Health Organization) are visually impaired because of uncorrected refractive errors (far and near sightedness). Almost all cases can be corrected, and normal vision can be restored with eyeglasses, contact lenses or refractive surgery.

The lack of eyeglasses denies children and adults opportunities for education, employment, and a better quality of life.

The Journey of Recycled Glasses

- 1. Lions and Leos collect used eyeglasses at various community locations.
- 2. The glasses are shipped to the nearest Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center where trained volunteers' sort, clean and determine the prescription strengths of the glasses.
- 3. Volunteers at the recycling center carefully package the prepared glasses and store them until they are required for eyeglass dispensing missions. Glasses that are not suitable for reuse

are recycled for scrap, with the earnings benefitting local Lions and Leos projects.

4. At the mission site, eye care professionals and trained Lion and Leo volunteers perform vision screenings and dispense the appropriate recycled glasses, free of charge, to children and adults in need.

The Lions Recycle Program does not benefit people in the US directly. The Wilmington Lions Club supplies a limited number of vouchers for eyeglasses and/or eye exams for needy residents in the Greater Wilmington Area. All intake for aid goes through the New Hanover

Department of Social Services or the New Hanover County Dept. of Services for the Blind. 100% of public donations to Lions clubs are used for charitable causes – none go for administrative expenses. Donations to aid local residents to obtain vision exams and eyeglasses can be sent to the Wilmington NC Lions Foundation, P. O. Box 7825, Wilmington, NC 28406. The Wilmington NC Lions Foundation is a 501 c (3).
